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## Summary – Attendance at a Glance

### Attendance Matters

Here at Nuneaton Academy, we have the highest expectations across all areas of school life including attendance. We value positive relationships between both staff and pupils, and want all pupils to feel they belong here and are valued. We work with our pupils to ensure that they have the highest possible attendance at school. We believe that this is the best way for them to succeed and to get the most out of all we have to offer.

There is a clear link between academic outcomes and school attendance. We want all pupils to achieve excellent outcomes to give themselves the very best chance in life.

There are 175 non-school days per year for holidays, shopping and appointments. There is no need, except in extreme circumstances to miss a day's education. If you miss one session in a week (remember, there are two sessions per day) your attendance is 90%.

This means you miss 19 days of education in a year and risk dropping one grade in your GCSEs.

It is vital we work together to teach our pupils the value of attending school each and every day. However, we do appreciate that at times, pupils may not be able to attend school. We ask our parents and carers to follow the processes below. They support our safeguarding procedures.

Should you have a concern about your child's attendance, then we ask that you contact us to discuss this. We believe in strong partnerships across all parts of school life. This includes attending school.

It is also important to us that pupils arrive to school on time, and they must be at school by [xx].

### Absence through illness or unforeseen circumstances

Parents must contact the school when their child is absent to explain that absence before 8:25am on the first and subsequent absent days. This can be done as follows through a phone call to the attendance team 02476 341134 and selecting option 1, or by emailing [attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk) or through the school app, with the following details:

- Full name of pupil
- Pupil's year group or form
- Reason for absence
- Full name of person reporting absence and relation to child

Do expect to receive a call back from the school to discuss your child's absence and to see if we can support in any way. If pupils suffer any form of injury, then we ask that you contact the school to make us aware. This is so we can do a risk assessment with you. It will identify impacts of the injury and the support your child may need. See section 7.3 of the full policy for further information.

### Attending an Appointment

Please schedule dental and non-urgent medical appointments outside of school hours. We know this might be tough for hospital visits. If rescheduling fails, your child must bring a medical letter or appointment card. We need it for our records. Pupils must be picked up and returned to school if their appointment ends during the school day. For more details, check section 6.2 of the full policy.

### Known Absence

Your child may need to miss school for exceptional reasons. If so, parents/carers should ask the Principal. They should use the form below. Where possible, this should be made at least four weeks before the required date. The form should be completed and emailed back



to [attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk) . If such a request is made, the school expects it to be short. But even then, they may not be able to approve it.

If the Principal does not authorise it, then any absence is 'unauthorised' and can incur a penalty.

We must follow legal rules. Therefore, we cannot approve holiday requests during term time. Additionally, we may issue penalty notices. For more details, please check the Attendance Policy and Procedures (section 6.1).

## Support

We take absence very seriously. We are committed to supporting any child who is finding it difficult to attend school regularly. We will target support for any pupil whose attendance falls below 95%. Further information on support can be found in the full policy.

## Punctuality

The school day starts at 08:45 and we expect your child to be in their first lesson at that time. Registers close at 09:15 and arrival after that time will mean the child is late. Lateness means they miss out on important routines which help get their day off to a positive start. Late arriving pupils also disrupt lessons during the day for others.

### How we manage lateness to school and lessons

#### Lateness to school

Pupils at Nuneaton Academy are expected to be on time as each day starts with a lesson. Pupils who are late for school, but arrive prior to 09:15 will remain in our reflection room until 11:25. Pupils who arrive after 09:15 will remain in reflection for the remainder of the day until 15:15

The register will stay open until 09.15, any pupil not present is marked absent. Pupils arriving late will be marked with an 'L' code unless they arrive after the morning register has closed, in which case they will be marked with a 'U' code which is unauthorised absence.

#### Lateness to lessons

If pupils are late to lessons, this is considered as truancy. Pupils are given 5 minutes to transition between lessons. Any pupil who arrives after these 5 minutes will spend the remainder of their day in reflection.

Parents may face prosecution if their child is often late after the register has closed. We'll watch for this and offer support. If the problem persists, we might take action.

The rest of this document outlines our Attendance Policy and Procedures. We encourage all parents to review it. This ensures they understand how we handle attendance. ## Part A - Policy

### 1. Introduction

This Attendance Policy outlines the culture and approach to supporting good attendance at our academy. The second part of the document outlines the more detailed procedures, roles and responsibilities related to pupil attendance that operate at our academy. Through all that we do to



manage attendance, we are committed to creating a positive learning environment, supporting pupil achievement, and complying with legal requirements.

This is a successful academy, and all pupils play their part in making it so. We aim for an environment which enables and encourages all members of the community to be proud to belong and to achieve their best. For our pupils to gain the greatest benefit from their education it is vital that they attend regularly and should be at school, on time, every day the school is open unless the reason for the absence is unavoidable. It is very important therefore that parents<sup>1</sup> make sure that children attends regularly, and this policy sets out how together we will achieve this.

Regular attendance at school is of critical importance to a child’s education. Evidence tells us that the pupils with the highest attainment at the end of key stage 2 and key stage 4 have higher rates of attendance over the key stage compared to those with the lowest attainment. Any absence affects the pattern of a pupil’s schooling and regular absence will seriously affect their learning. Any pupil’s absence disrupts the learning of others in the same teaching groups by disrupting classroom routines. **Ensuring your child’s regular attendance is your legal responsibility.**

The principles of a ‘support first approach’ are adopted and we seek to:

<b>Support first approach (as set out in DFE Guidance)</b>	
<b>Expect</b>	Aspire to high standards of attendance from all pupils and parents and build a culture where all can, and want to, be in school and ready to learn by prioritising attendance improvement across the school.
<b>Monitor</b>	Rigorously use attendance data to identify patterns of poor attendance (at individual and cohort level) as soon as possible so all parties can work together to resolve them before they become entrenched.
<b>Listen and understand</b>	When a pattern is spotted, discuss with pupils and parents to listen to and understand barriers to attendance and agree how all partners can work together to resolve them.
<b>Facilitate support</b>	Remove barriers in school and help pupils and parents to access the support they need to overcome the barriers outside of school. This might include an early help or whole family plan where absence is a symptom of wider issues.
<b>Formalise support</b>	Where absence persists and voluntary support is not working or not being engaged with, partners should work together to explain the consequences clearly and ensure support is also in place to enable families to respond. Depending on the circumstances this may include formalising support through an attendance contract or education supervision order.
<b>Enforce</b>	Where all other avenues have been exhausted and support is not working or not being engaged with, enforce attendance through statutory intervention: a penalty notice in line with the National Framework or prosecution to protect the pupil’s right to an education.

<sup>1</sup> The definition of a parent can be found in the Education Act 1996, and this applies to all the legislation to which this guidance relates. In addition to the child’s birth parents, references to parents in this guidance include any person who has parental responsibility (which includes the local authority where it has a care order in respect of the child) and any person (for example, a foster carer) who has care of the child. To reflect this, this guidance uses ‘parent’ to refer to both parents and carers.



The school follows the 5 Foundations of Effective Attendance Practice as shown below:

- **Foundation 1:** *The school has a fully embedded ethos in which excellent school attendance is expected, developed and nurtured. The escalated approach to supporting attendance is built on foundations of belonging and connectedness.*
- **Foundation 2:** *The approach to improving attendance is built on clear policies, systems and processes. This ensures continuous and sustainable improvement drives attendance practice. The attendance policy is understood by all stakeholders and allows the school to set, and maintain, high expectations to improve the culture of attendance.*
- **Foundation 3:** *The school prioritises developing a team of attendance experts, with a shared vision and core purpose. The Attendance Leader delivers bespoke training to support all staff to fully understand their role in improving attendance. External partnerships support attendance improvements through a multi-disciplinary approach for identified children and families.*
- **Foundation 4:** *Data information and analysis direct resources proactively towards key demographic groups and identified individuals. The expert use of data analysis informs decision making at all levels. The attendance process ensures the Attendance Leader understands the reason for attendance concerns, these barriers can then be successfully supported and removed.*
- **Foundation 5:** *Connecting and belonging drives the school approach to supporting attendance. All staff are supported to understand 'deeper roots' regarding poor attendance concerns. The school has developed, and embedded, an effective rewards system to further drive attendance improvements and celebrate success*

## 2. Aims

Our aim is to create a school environment where children feel they belong and want to come to school. We believe our school is a great place to learn, and that being in school day in, day out, is in the best interests of all our pupils. However, we recognise that there will be times when there may be barriers that prevent children from attending school. In these instances we will act early to understand the issue, provide support and work with the child and their family to get them back to regular attendance as quickly as possible.

We believe that one of the most important factors in promoting good attendance is the development of positive attitudes towards school and a sense of belonging. To this end, we strive to make our school a happy and rewarding experience for all children, and to foster positive and mutually respectful relationships with parents.

By promoting good attendance and punctuality we aim to:

- Make good attendance and punctuality a priority for all those involved in the school community.
- Raise our pupils' awareness of the importance of good attendance and punctuality.
- Provide support, advice and guidelines to parents, pupils and staff.
- Work in partnership with parents, including regularly informing them about their child's absence and attendance levels.
- Support pupils back into school following a lengthy or unavoidable period of absence and provide support to build confidence and bridge gaps.
- Celebrate and reward good attendance and punctuality.





This policy sets out our school's position on attendance and details the procedures that all parents<sup>2</sup> must follow to report their child's absence from school and to remind them of their legal duty, to ensure their child attends school regularly.

This policy will be applied fairly and consistently, considering the individual needs of our pupils and their families who have specific barriers to attendance. Therefore, in the development of our policy we have considered our obligations under the Equality Act 2010 and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

We will also support parents to perform their legal duty to ensure their children of compulsory<sup>3</sup> school age attend regularly and will promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

We want our pupils to go to school every day unless they are not well enough to attend. We believe that children who attend school regularly are more likely to feel settled in school, maintain friendships, keep up with their learning and gain the greatest benefit from their education. We want all our pupils to enjoy school, grow up to become emotionally resilient, confident and competent adults who can realise their full potential. Regular attendance and punctuality are essential in the workplace and children who are used to attending school on time, and on every occasion unless they are too unwell to attend, will be better prepared for the attendance expectations in the workplace.

In April 2017 the Supreme Court clarified the definition of regular attendance to be attendance "in accordance with the rules prescribed by the school", therefore if an absence is not authorised by the school, the pupil's attendance is deemed to be irregular.

We will do all we can to encourage our pupils to attend. We will also make available the best provision we can for any pupil who needs additional support in school or who is prevented from attending school, due to a medical condition.

## 2.1. Effects of non-attendance

The table below indicates how what might seem like just a few days absence can result in children missing a significant number of lessons.

## 3. Safeguarding and Attendance

Our school will monitor trends and patterns of absence for all pupils as a part of our standard procedures. However, we are aware that sudden or gradual changes in a pupil's attendance may indicate additional or more extreme safeguarding issues. In line with government guidance [Keeping](#)

<sup>2</sup> Education law defines parents as: all natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person who has parental responsibility for a child or young person; and any person who has care of a child or young person i.e., lives with and looks after the child. In this policy the term 'parent' includes parents and carers.

<sup>3</sup> A child becomes of 'compulsory school age' on the 1st January, 1st April or 1st September following their 5th birthday and ceases to be of compulsory school age on the last Friday in June of Year 11.



[Children Safe in Education](#) we will investigate and report any suspected safeguarding cases on to the relevant authorities. As part of our safeguarding duty and our standard procedures, we will inform the Local Authority and/or the Police of the details of any pupil who is absent from school when the school cannot establish their whereabouts and is concerned for the pupil's welfare.

#### 4. Legislation and Guidance

This policy meets the requirements of the government guidance 2024 [Working together to improve school attendance \(applies from 19 August 2024\) \(publishing.service.gov.uk\)](#) from the Department for Education (DfE), and refers to the DfE's 2015 statutory guidance on [School Attendance Parental Responsibility Measures](#). These documents are drawn from legislation setting out the legal powers and duties that govern school attendance including:

- The Education (Information about Individual Pupils) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2024
- The Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendments) Regulations 2024

#### 5. Using data to support improvements in attendance

Any absence affects the pattern of a child's schooling and regular absence may seriously affect their learning. The Department for Education (DfE) defines a pupil as a 'persistent absentee' when they miss 10% or more schooling across the school year, for whatever reason. For pupils who miss more than 50% of possible sessions they are defined as 'severely absent'.

The school will ensure that data, including the DfE's View Your Education Data platform, is routinely monitored to identify emerging attendance issues and will seek to prevent any pupil becoming persistently or severely absent. This will include: identifying the individual needs of pupils; working closely with families and wider support services to remove barriers to attendance; and where a formalised approach in conjunction with the local authority is required in line with the DfE guidance [Working Together to Improve School Attendance](#).

#### 6. Understanding Barriers to Attendance

In relation to understanding barriers to attendance, we will ensure all pupils and parents are treated with dignity and staff will model respectful relationships to build a positive understanding between home and school that can be the foundation of good attendance. In communicating with parents, we will highlight the link between attendance and attainment and wider wellbeing and enhance their understanding of what good attendance looks like. Where a pupil or family needs support with attendance we will identify who is best placed to work with them to address issues.

We will support pupils and parents by working together to address any in-school barriers to attendance. Where barriers are outside of the school's control, all partners should work together to support pupils and parents to access any support they may need voluntarily.

Where absence intensifies, so should the support provided, which will require the school to work in tandem with the local authority and other relevant partners.



Some pupils face greater barriers to attendance than their peers. These can include pupils who suffer from long term medical conditions or who have special educational needs and disabilities. In working with parents to improve attendance, we are mindful of the barriers these pupils face and will put additional support in place where necessary to help them access their full-time education.

Reduced timetables will only be used in exceptional circumstances, for a limited period and to support pupils to reintegrate back into education to access fulltime provision.

The school is committed to share information and work collaboratively with other schools in the area, local authorities and other partners when absence is at risk of becoming persistent or severe

## **7. Staff Training on Attendance**

Improving attendance requires knowledge of guidance and regulations but also expertise in working with families to remove barriers to attendance and safeguard pupils. Just as those barriers are regularly evolving, so too is the training that school staff require to address them. The school therefore will facilitate training for all staff to understand

- the importance of good attendance and that absence is almost always a symptom of wider circumstances,
- the law and requirements of schools including on the keeping of registers
- the school/trust strategies and procedures for tracking, following up and improving attendance,
- the processes for working with other partners to provide more intensive support to pupils who need it.

For staff with specialist attendance responsibilities, they will receive training to include

- the necessary skills to interpret and analyse attendance data,
- and any additional training that would be beneficial to support pupils and pupil cohorts overcome commonly seen barriers to attendance.



## Part B - What the Law Says and Our Procedures

### 1. Roles and Responsibilities

This section outlines responsibilities of particular members of staff in relation to attendance.

- The name and contact details of the senior leader responsible for the strategic approach to attendance in school are Mr Simon Trout and Mrs Kate Darby.
- Responsibility for identifying unexplained absences on “day 1” will fall to Sonia Millar, Attendance Officer and the wider attendance team who will work alongside the pastoral and safeguarding teams to identify unexplained absences
- Responsibility for identifying further unexplained absences will fall to Sonia Millar, Attendance Officer and the wider attendance team who will work alongside the pastoral and safeguarding teams to identify unexplained absences
- More detailed support on attendance can be requested from the pastoral team or our safeguarding team. The details of our safeguarding tea can be found on the school website

### The Local Governing Body

The Local Governing Body is responsible for monitoring attendance figures for the whole school on at least a termly basis (6 times a year). It also holds the headteacher to account for the implementation of this policy.

The LGB recognises the importance of school attendance and will:

- Promote it across the school’s ethos and policies
- Ensure school leaders fulfil expectations and statutory duties
- Regularly review attendance data, discuss, and challenge trends, and help school leaders focus improvement efforts on the individual pupils or cohorts who need it most
- Ensure Nuneaton Academy staff receive adequate training on attendance

The LGB will also ensure:

- That the attendance policy and its contents are generally made known within the school and to parents of registered pupils at the school, and
- That steps are taken at least once in every school year to bring the attendance policy to the attention of all those parents and pupils and all persons who work at the school (whether or not for payment).

### The Headteacher/Principal

The headteacher/principal is responsible for ensuring this policy is implemented consistently across the school, and for monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors.

The headteacher/principal also supports other staff in monitoring the attendance of individual pupils and requests fixed-penalty notices, where necessary.

### The Attendance Champions

Mr Simon Trout and Mrs Kate Darby are the school attendance champions.

The role of an Attendance Champion in a school is vital for promoting and ensuring consistent student attendance, which is directly linked to academic success and overall well-being. The responsibilities and expectations of an Attendance Champion typically include the following:

- Promoting Good Attendance - Raising awareness: The Attendance Champion actively promotes the importance of regular attendance to students, parents, and staff. This can



include leading campaigns, assemblies, and initiatives that highlight the benefits of good attendance for academic performance and social development.

- Communicating with stakeholders: Regular communication with parents/carers about the school's attendance expectations and the consequences of poor attendance is essential. The Champion also works closely with pupils to understand the barriers they may face in attending school.
- Monitoring Attendance Data - Tracking attendance: Using attendance software or school systems, the Attendance Champion monitors students' attendance records, identifying patterns of absenteeism, lateness, and truancy. This can involve both real-time tracking and reviewing historical data.
- Analysing trends: The Attendance Champion looks for trends and gaps in attendance, including specific groups (such as vulnerable or disadvantaged pupils) who may need additional support. This helps in formulating targeted interventions.
- Intervening in Cases of Persistent Absence - Early intervention: When attendance issues arise, the Attendance Champion works quickly to intervene. This might involve meeting with pupils, parents/carers, and staff to understand the reasons for absenteeism and to put support mechanisms in place.
- Supporting individual students - For students with persistent absence, tailored plans may be developed, including mentoring, counselling, or working with external agencies like social services or the local authority's education welfare officers.
- Collaboration with staff - The Attendance Champion often collaborates with teachers, pastoral staff, and safeguarding teams to ensure attendance is prioritised within the school environment. This includes integrating attendance goals into broader school improvement plans.
- Encouraging positive relationships - A key aspect is forming strong, trusting relationships with pupils, encouraging them to feel motivated and supported to attend school regularly.
- Rewarding Positive Attendance - Recognition and rewards: Encouraging a culture of good attendance can include implementing reward systems, such as certificates, assemblies, or other recognitions for pupils who consistently attend or show improvement.
- Celebrating achievements: The Champion organises school-wide initiatives to celebrate attendance milestones, motivating pupils to strive for regular and punctual attendance.
- Working with External Agencies - Partnership with external bodies: The Attendance Champion liaises with external agencies such as local authorities, health services, and social services to support families and pupils struggling with attendance due to complex issues.
- Supporting School Policies -Policy development: The Attendance Champion contributes to the development and implementation of school attendance policies, ensuring they align with national guidelines and local authority requirements.
- Ensuring compliance: This role also involves making sure that legal obligations, such as the duty to inform local authorities about persistent absence, are met.

### **Attendance Officer**

The role of the attendance officer is as follows:

- Monitors attendance data at the school and individual pupil level.
- Reports concerns about attendance to the headteacher and Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) as appropriate.
- Arranges calls and meetings with parents to discuss attendance issues.
- Co-ordinates requests for Term-time Leave of Absence (this includes liaison with the DSL and Safeguarding Team) and advises the headteacher as requested.

### **Pastoral Head of House, Head of House**



- **Phone Calls to Parents/Carers:** When a pupil's attendance begins to decline, Heads of House often initiate the first level of intervention through direct phone calls to parents/carers. This is to discuss the reasons for absence and offer support.
- **Home Visits:** In more serious or persistent cases of absenteeism, Pastoral Heads of House may conduct home visits to establish a deeper understanding of the barriers to attendance, to ensure the welfare of the child, and to communicate the importance of regular attendance. These visits can help build a stronger relationship between home and school.
- **Meetings with Parents/Carers:** Formal meetings are arranged where attendance does not improve. These meetings are used to discuss attendance concerns, offer support, and work collaboratively to agree on a plan to improve attendance. External agencies may be involved, where appropriate.
- **Heads of House work closely with the school's Attendance Officer,** sharing information and strategies for improving attendance. They also liaise with form tutors and subject teachers to gather insight into possible attendance barriers.
- **Sharing Concerns:** Where attendance is linked to broader behavioural or safeguarding concerns, the Head of House will communicate these issues to senior leadership or safeguarding teams.
- **Heads of House may also be involved in developing incentives to promote good attendance,** such as attendance awards or recognition schemes, thereby creating a culture of attendance and punctuality within the House system.
- **Ensuring joined up pastoral care is in place where needed and consider whether a time-limited phased return to school would be appropriate,** for example for those affected by anxiety about school attendance, recognising that such arrangements can be for a limited time only.

### **Form Tutors**

The role of a form tutor in relation to attendance is crucial as they are a key point of contact for pupils each day and play a key part in promoting regular attendance. Their involvement is proactive and supportive, encouraging pupils to understand the importance of attendance while identifying early signs of absenteeism. The following outlines their key responsibilities:

- **Monitoring Attendance Patterns:** Over time, form tutors can observe patterns of attendance, such as frequent lateness or intermittent absences, and alert the relevant Pastoral Head of House or Attendance Officer for further investigation.
- **Positive Reinforcement:** Form tutors play a significant role in fostering a culture of good attendance within the school. They can praise pupils with strong or improving attendance, using assemblies, tutor group discussions, or reward schemes to celebrate and encourage consistent attendance.
- **Setting Expectations:** Form tutors set the tone by emphasising the link between good attendance, academic achievement, and long-term success. Regularly discussing the importance of punctuality and attendance helps reinforce school values around responsibility and commitment.
- **Competitions and Incentives:** Tutors may be involved in organising attendance competitions within their tutor group or house system, encouraging friendly competition and recognising those with perfect or improved attendance.
- **Pupil Check-Ins:** Form tutors often have a close relationship with their pupils and can identify if there are underlying issues that might be affecting attendance, such as illness, family problems, or emotional difficulties. These can be addressed through conversations, either informally or through structured one-to-one meetings.
- **Parental Engagement:** In some cases, form tutors may communicate directly with parents or carers, particularly if they have established a strong relationship with the family. This can include phone calls or meetings to discuss attendance concerns and offer support.



- Wellbeing Focus: Form tutors are often key figures in providing emotional support to pupils. If a pupil is struggling with attendance due to personal or mental health issues, form tutors can offer reassurance, direct pupils to appropriate school support services, and work to create a welcoming environment that encourages regular school attendance.

### Class Teachers and Curriculum Leads

The role of the class teacher in relation to attendance is central to ensuring that pupils maintain consistent learning progress and that any absences do not lead to significant learning gaps.

- Tracking Attendance: Class teachers are responsible for taking accurate attendance for each lesson. This not only ensures a legal record of pupil attendance but also allows the teacher to monitor patterns, such as repeated absences on specific days or in particular subjects.

### Supporting Pupils Who Miss Lessons

- Lesson Planning for Missed Content: When pupils miss lessons, it is the responsibility of the class teacher to ensure that they can catch up on the material. This may involve providing:
  - Lesson notes or summaries of missed content.
  - Homework or independent study tasks designed to cover the learning missed.
  - Online resources or pre-recorded lessons, if available, to help pupils access the material remotely.
- Planning Catch-Up Work: Teachers/curriculum leaders may organise specific sessions or tasks to help pupil's close gaps in their learning. This might include small group interventions, peer support, or additional homework tasks.
- Assessing Gaps in Knowledge: On a pupil's return from absence, class teachers assess their understanding of the missed material to ensure they are not falling behind. This may involve informal questioning, quizzes, or reviewing their classwork to identify gaps
- Working with Curriculum Leaders: Class teachers often collaborate with Curriculum Leaders to ensure that learning plans are adaptable for pupils who miss significant amounts of time. This might involve coordinating curriculum delivery or providing catch-up resources that align with department-wide goals.
- Cross-Departmental Support: Where pupils have attendance issues across multiple subjects, class teachers can work with other staff to ensure a unified approach to supporting the pupil's learning.

## 2. Contents of the Admissions Register

The admission register (sometimes referred to as the school roll) must contain specific personal details of every pupil in the school along with the date of admission or re-admission to the school, information regarding parents and carers, and details of the school last attended. The school will enter pupils on the admission register at the beginning of the first day on which the school has agreed with, or been notified by the parent, that the pupil will attend.

A pupil's name can only lawfully be deleted from the admission register if a reason set out in regulation 9 of the **School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024**.

It is vital that the admission register is kept up to date, it is a legal document. Therefore, we encourage parents to inform the school of any changes whenever they occur and ensure the admission register is amended as soon as possible.

## 3. Contents of Attendance Register

The law makes it clear that schools must take the attendance register at the start of the morning session of each school day and once during the afternoon session. On each occasion the register is



taken, the appropriate attendance and absence code must be entered for every pupil. Please refer to **Working Together To Improve School Attendance** for the code descriptors and also **Appendix A** of this document. The school must record whether each pupil is:

- Attending, or
- Absent

Effective and timely use and sharing of register data is critical to safeguard children, improve attendance and is supported using our electronic Management Information System to record attendance information. Our registers will be preserved for 6 years from the date after the last entry was made.

#### 4. Attending the School (and Lateness)

Pupils are marked present (/ \) if they are in school when the register is taken. If a pupil leaves the school premises after registration they are still counted as present for statistical purposes.

It is the duty of parents to ensure that children attend school on time. This encourages habits of good timekeeping and lessens any possible classroom disruption.

Our pupils must arrive by 8:45 am on each school day.

Our morning register is taken at 8:45 am and will be kept open until 9:15am

Our afternoon register is taken at 12:15pm and will be kept open until 12:45pm

A pupil who arrives late but before the register has closed will be marked as late (L) – which counts as present.

If a pupil arrives after the register has closed they will be marked with the unauthorised absence code “Late after registers close” (U) which is an unauthorised absence mark.

However, if the pupil is late arriving due to a valid reason such as an unavoidable medical appointment, the absence will be authorised and coded accordingly. #### 5. Attending a place other than the school

Pupils are marked as attending a place other than the school if they are present for the assigned session. These codes include:

- Code K Attending education provision arranged by the local authority
- Code V: Attending an educational visit or trip
- Code P: Participating in a sporting activity
- Code W: Attending work experience
- Code B: Attending any other approved education activity
- Code D: Dual registered at another setting

Our school retains responsibilities for the safeguarding and welfare of pupils attending an approved educational activity. Our school must be satisfied that appropriate measures have been taken to safeguard the pupil. Our school should ensure that we have in place arrangements whereby providers notify the school of any absence. Our school must record the pupil’s absence using the relevant absence code.

If a pupil is attending an alternative education provider such as another school or Pupil Referral Unit for part or all of their education, our school will make arrangements for the pupil to be dual registered at the other setting and mark our registers accordingly.





If a pupil is attending an alternative education provider arranged by the school, which is not a school or Pupil Referral Unit, for part or all their education, we will mark the sessions which the pupil attends the alternative setting as code B (any other approved educational activity).

The school expects the alternative provision (AP) to notify us of any absences by individual pupils, to ensure we become aware of any attendance concerns as soon as possible and take follow up action as necessary. Attendance updates will be provided on a daily basis providing AM and PM marks, or more frequently if agreed with the alternative setting. Any attendance concerns will be followed up by us, in conjunction with the Alternative Provision (AP).

## 6. Absent – Leave of absence

A leave of absence means that the school has given approval in advance for a pupil of compulsory school age to be away from the school. These codes are classified for statistical purposes as 'authorised absence' which means the pupil's absence is with permission granted by the school. These codes include:

- Code C1: Leave of absence for the purpose of participating in a regulated performance or undertaking regulated employment abroad
- Code M: Leave of absence for the purpose of attending a medical or dental appointment
- Code J1: Leave of absence for the purpose of attending an interview for employment or for admission to another educational institution
- Code S: Leave of absence for the purpose of studying for a public examination
- Code X: Non-compulsory school age pupil not required to attend school
- Code C2: Leave of absence for a compulsory school age pupil subject to a part-time timetable
- Code C: Leave of absence for exceptional circumstance

### 6.1. Leave of Absence Requests – 'Exceptional Circumstances'

**The law does not grant parents the automatic right to take their child out of school during term time.** The law states a leave of absence may only be granted by a school if an application is made in advance and if it considers there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application.

Only exceptional circumstances warrant an authorised leave of absence. Generally, a need or desire for a holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure and recreation would not constitute an exceptional circumstance. The school will consider each application individually, considering the specific facts and circumstances and relevant background context behind the request. The request must be made by the parent with whom the child normally lives, and permission must be sought in advance. The school will not grant leave of absence unless there are exceptional circumstances. The school must be satisfied that there are exceptional circumstances, based on the individual facts and circumstances of the case; following consultation with other staff as required, including the Designated Safeguarding Lead. Where a leave of absence is granted, the school will determine the number of days the pupil can be away from school. A leave of absence is granted entirely at the school's discretion.

Circumstances which could be authorised include significant family emergencies or funerals. However, parents will also be aware that, wherever possible, it can be better for children to continue to attend school normally during difficult family times.

Parents should complete a Leave of Absence Request form which is available from the school. Leave of Absence Request forms can be obtained by contacting the attendance team on 02476 341134 and selecting option 1, or by emailing [attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk).

The request should be submitted as soon as it is anticipated; and wherever possible, at least **four weeks** before the absence. **Although such absence may be unauthorised, it is better that we know**



**your child is safe, rather than missing.** Please be aware that you may be required to provide us with additional evidence to support your request. If we have any concerns about possible safeguarding risks such as risk of FGM or Forced Marriage, we will follow the necessary protocols.

All term time absence for children in care should be discussed at the child's Personal Education Planning (PEP) meeting in advance where possible and agreed with the Social Care and Virtual School. This permission should be gained before school is approached for approval. The school will contact the Virtual School in relation to any requests for term time absence for a child in care.

#### Expectations

- A leave of absence is granted entirely at the school's discretion. Permission for a Leave of Absence from a school may only be given by a person who the school's proprietor has authorised to do so (an authorised person).
- Schools must judge each application individually considering the specific facts and circumstances and relevant background context behind each request.
- Generally, a need or desire for a holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure and recreation would not constitute an exceptional circumstance.
- Where a leave of absence is granted, the school will determine the number of days a pupil can be absent from school.
- When making an application for Leave of Absence parents are advised to give sufficient information and time to allow the Head teacher the opportunity to consider all the exceptional circumstances and to notify the parents of their decision. The school may also request further information on the application and supporting documentation where appropriate.
- It is advised that if the resident parent has not received notification or a response regarding the leave of absence application, it is their responsibility to ascertain if the leave is authorised prior to the start of the leave.
- The school can only consider applications for Leave of Absence which are made by the resident parent. i.e., the parent with whom the child normally resides.
- Where applications for Leave of Absences are made in advance and refused, the child is expected to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an "unauthorised" absence. Where a leave of absence is requested but additional days take either prior to or after the request, they may be considered as part of the leave of absence.
- Leave of Absences which are not made in advance cannot be authorised in line with legislation. This will result in the absence being recorded as 'unauthorised'.
- All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service of Warwickshire County Council. Penalty notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices and in the first instance, as an alternative to prosecution proceedings.
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- Where a Penalty Notice is not paid within the timeframe set out in that Notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal prosecution proceedings under S444 of Education Act 1996.

#### Leave of Absence taken in the academic year 2024-25

**The law relating to Penalty Notices changed with effect from 19 August 2024. Therefore, Penalty Notices issued for Leave of Absence taken from September 2024 will be issued in accordance with the updated legislation.**

Penalty Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices – 4 in total).



- First Leave of Absence Offence: The amount of £160 to be paid within 28 days, this is reduced to £80 each child if paid within 21 days.
- Second Leave of Absence Offence within a 3-year period (from the date of issue of the first penalty notice): The amount of £160 paid within 28 days. No reduced amount.
- Third Leave of Absence offence within a 3-year period (from the date of issue of the first penalty notice). A Penalty Notice will not be issued and the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal prosecution proceedings under S444 of Education Act 1996.

## 6.2 Medical/Dental Appointments

Parents should try to make appointments outside school hours wherever possible. Where appointments during school time are unavoidable, the pupil should only be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary for the appointment. It is not acceptable for a child to miss a whole day's schooling for an appointment, unless necessary, in which case the school will need an explanation as to why this is.

No pupil will be allowed to leave the school site to attend a medical appointment during the school day without parental confirmation.

Advance notice is required for medical or dental appointments, unless it's an emergency appointment, and must be supported by providing the school with sight of, or a copy of, the appointment card or letter – only then will the absence be authorised.

Parents must inform the school of any medical appointment in advance. This can be done as follows through a phone call to the attendance team 02476 341134 and selecting option 1, or by emailing [attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk) or through the school app, with the following details:

## 6.3 Part-time timetables - Leave of absence for a compulsory school age pupil subject to a part-time timetable

Pupils are entitled to a full-time education, suitable to their age, ability and aptitude, and any special educational needs or disabilities that they may have.

If, for any reason, our school is unable to provide a pupil with a full-time education due to the pupil's needs, we will work with the pupil, parent and other agencies where appropriate, to come to a mutually convenient arrangement. Any reduced timetables will be for the shortest amount of time possible, whilst arrangements are made to support the pupil's return to full-time provision as soon as possible.

## 7. Absent – other authorised reasons

Absent due to other authorised reasons means that the school has given approval in advance for a pupil of compulsory school age to be away from the school or has accepted an explanation offered afterwards as justification for absence. These codes are classified for statistical purposes as 'authorised absence'. These codes include:

- Code T: Parent travelling for occupational purposes
- Code R: Religious observance
- Code I: Illness (not medical or dental appointment)
- Code E: Suspended or permanently excluded and no alternative provision made



### 7.1. Mobile pupil - Parent travelling for occupational purposes

The school will authorise the absence of a mobile pupil of no fixed abode who is unable to attend school because they are travelling with their parent who is engaged in a trade or business of such a nature as to require them to travel from place to place. This is subject to certain limits, depending on the child's age and number of sessions absent. The school will discuss cases individually with Traveller parents as necessary. Parents should let the school know of their plans as far in advance as possible. Authorised Traveller absence will be recorded appropriately in the register.

To help ensure continuity of education for Traveller children, wherever possible, the child should attend school elsewhere when their family is travelling for occupational purposes. In which case the child will be dual registered at that school and this school, which is their 'main' school.

Children from Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities whose families do not travel for occupational purposes are expected to register at school and attend as normal. They are subject to the same rules as other children in terms of the requirement to attend school regularly.

### 7.2. Religious Observance

Our school acknowledges the multi-faith nature of the school community and recognises that on some occasions, religious festivals may fall outside of school holidays or weekends.

In accordance with the law, the school will authorise **one day's absence** for a day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parent belongs. Should any additional days be necessary, they should be requested in advance using the leave of absence in term time process. Additional days taken without exceptional circumstances will be recorded in the register as unauthorised absence. If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parents' religious body, to confirm whether the day is set apart.

### 7.3. Illness

In most cases, absences for illness which are reported by following the school's absence reporting procedures will be authorised. That is unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.

The school follows Department for Education guidance '[Working together to improve school attendance \(applies from 19 August 2024\) \(publishing.service.gov.uk\)](https://publishing.service.gov.uk/government/uploads/system/uploads/attachment_data/file/123456/Working_together_to_improve_school_attendance.pdf)' 2024<sup>4</sup> which states that if the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask the parent to provide medical evidence, such as a prescription, appointment card, or other appropriate form of evidence.

Where a parent cannot provide any written evidence, we will endeavour to have a conversation with the parent and pupil, if appropriate, which may itself serve as the necessary evidence to record the absence.

We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily. In some instances, the school may ask the parent to obtain a letter from a GP, or the school may seek parental permission to contact the pupil's GP directly to help support the needs of the individual pupil.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

Where a pupil has a high level and/or frequency of absence, the school may require medical evidence of some description in order to authorise any future medical absences. If this is the case, the school will make the parent/s aware of this expectation in advance.

The reporting of absence due to illness remains the responsibility of the parent. Absences due to illness which have **not** been reported to the school by the parent on the first day of absence may not be authorised.

Parents must contact the school when their child is absent to explain that absence before 8:25am on the first and subsequent absent days. This can be done as follows through a phone call to the attendance team 02476 341134 and selecting option 1, or by emailing [attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:attendance@nuneatonacademy.org.uk) or through the school app, with the following details:

If a child is absent for more than one day, the parent should contact the school each day to provide an update on the child's condition, unless otherwise agreed by the school.

### **Mental Health and Wellbeing**

Parents who have concerns about their child's mental wellbeing can contact our school's safeguarding officer/s via email: [karen.thompson@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:karen.thompson@nuneatonacademy.org.uk) or [lindsay.baker@nuneatonacademy.org.uk](mailto:lindsay.baker@nuneatonacademy.org.uk) for further information on the support available.

Parents should also contact their GP or the NHS Helpline by phoning telephone number 111 for advice if they are concerned. In case of emergency parents should dial 999.

### **Pupils taken ill during the school day**

If a pupil needs to be sent home due to illness, this should be by agreement with an appropriately authorised member of school staff. In such circumstances, no pupil will be allowed to leave the school site without parental confirmation.

## **7.4. Suspensions (Exclusions)**

In this policy, the word 'suspension' is used to refer to what legislation calls an exclusion for a fixed period. Suspensions and permanent exclusions are both types of exclusion, and where this policy uses the word 'exclusion' this includes both suspensions (fixed-period exclusions) and permanent exclusions.

If the school decides to send a pupil home due to their behaviour, this will be recorded as an exclusion. The school will follow the current [DfE's statutory guidance on suspensions and permanent exclusions](#). The full behaviour and exclusions policy for our school can be found here <https://www.nuneatonacademy.org.uk/our-academies/policies>

Any exclusion **must** be agreed by the Headteacher.

The school will notify the parent of the exclusion in writing. If the pupil is a Child in Care, the school will notify the pupil's carer, social worker and the Virtual School. In other instances, where a pupil is open to Children's Social Care for any reason, the school will also inform their allocated social worker.

No pupil will be allowed to leave the school site without parental confirmation.

## **8. Absent – unable to attend school because of unavoidable cause**

In accordance with DfE school attendance guidance, our school will record pupils as 'Unable to attend school because of unavoidable cause' in the following circumstances (such circumstances are not recorded as absences and are not counted as possible attendances):

- Code Q: Unable to attend because of a lack of access arrangements



- Code Y1: Unable to attend due to transport normally provided not being available
- Code Y2: Unable to attend due to widespread disruption to travel
- Code Y3: Unable to attend due to part of the school premises being closed
- Code Y4: Unable to attend due to the whole school site being unexpectedly closed
- Code Y5: Unable to attend as pupil is in criminal justice detention
- Code Y6: Unable to attend in accordance with public health guidance or law
- Code Y7: Unable to attend because of any other unavoidable cause

## 9. Absent - unauthorised absence

Unauthorised absence is where a school is not satisfied with the reasons given for the absence or no reason for absence was provided.

Absence will be unauthorised if a pupil is absent from school without the permission of the school. Whilst parents can provide explanations for absences, it is the school's decision whether to authorise the absence or not.

Unauthorised absence includes:

- Absences which have never been properly explained
- Pupils who arrive at school too late to get a mark
- Shopping
- Birthdays
- Waiting at home for a washing machine to be mended, or a parcel to be delivered
- Day trips
- Long weekends and holidays in term time (unless very exceptional circumstances are agreed in writing, in advance by the school)
- In the case of term time leave - if a pupil is kept away from school longer than was agreed, the additional absence is unauthorised

Unauthorised absences may result in Legal Sanctions, usually Penalty Notices or Prosecutions. The unauthorised absence codes include:

- Code G – Holiday not granted by the school
- Code N – Reason for absence not yet established
- Code O – Absent in other or unknown circumstances
- Code U – Arrived in school after registration closed

## 10. Administrative codes

Where necessary and applicable, our school will use the defined administrative codes. These codes are not collected for statistical purposes and are:

- Code Z: Prospective pupil not on admissions register
- Code #: Planned whole school closure

## 11. First Day of Absence Response

At The Nuneaton Academy, the safety and wellbeing of all pupils are paramount. As part of our commitment to safeguarding, we have a robust procedure in place for responding to pupil absences on the first day.

Shortly after the morning register closes, a notification of absence will be sent to parents or carers via the school app and email. This communication informs the parent or carer that their child has not arrived at school.



Following this notification, staff from the admin team, safeguarding team, attendance team, or pastoral team will contact parents or carers directly. This is done to verify the reason for the absence and ensure the pupil's safety.

To ensure effective communication, parents and carers must supply the contact details of at least three emergency contacts. These contacts will be used if the primary parent or carer cannot be reached. The emergency contact details are reviewed on a yearly basis, with opportunities for parents to update this information during parents' evenings and through reminders in school newsletters.

It is expected that parents or carers notify the school of their child's absence as early as possible on the first day of non-attendance. In the absence of this communication, the school will proceed with the outlined process to ensure every pupil is accounted for, safeguarding our students and providing reassurance to parents and carers.

If the school is unable to contact any of the emergency numbers provided, and is concerned for the welfare of the pupil, we may undertake our own 'safe and well' checks and/or request a Welfare Check from the police.

## 12. Rewarding Good and Improved Attendance

Our school has a motivating rewards system to encourage good attendance and punctuality, recognising the importance of being present and prepared for learning. We aim to ensure that pupils feel valued for their efforts and are rewarded for their commitment to school life.

Each day, pupils who arrive on time and with the correct equipment will be issued a Golden Ticket. These tickets serve as a daily incentive and acknowledgment of their preparedness and punctuality. At the end of each half-term, these tickets will be entered into a prize draw, giving pupils the opportunity to win a variety of exciting prizes. The more Golden Tickets a pupil earns, the higher their chances of winning.

To encourage a collective effort, the form group with the highest attendance each week will be given the privilege of wearing non-uniform on the Friday of that week. This reward fosters a sense of teamwork and encourages pupils to support one another in attending school regularly.

Attendance also plays a key role in our overall House Competition, with attendance points contributing to each house's progress towards winning the House Trophy. The more consistently pupils attend, the more points they can earn for their house, giving an added incentive to ensure they are present and ready to learn.

As part of our unique approach to celebrating good attendance, we regularly invite musicians into the school to put on special performances known as Attendance Recognition Gigs. These events are held to recognise pupils' dedication to maintaining good attendance, providing an enjoyable and memorable experience that rewards pupils in a creative and fun way.

For pupils who maintain strong attendance throughout the year, there is an exciting End-of-Year Trip. This trip is designed to reward those who have demonstrated consistent attendance and commitment to their learning, offering them the chance to participate in a special excursion as a celebration of their efforts.

For our Year 11 pupils, there is an additional reward of a reduced-price prom ticket. This discount is based on a range of criteria, with attendance being a significant factor. Pupils who show consistent attendance and meet other set criteria will be eligible for this reward, making their prom experience even more accessible.

This comprehensive rewards system not only motivates pupils to attend regularly but also fosters a positive school culture where attendance is celebrated and valued. We believe that recognising and rewarding these efforts helps to instil responsibility and a sense of achievement in our pupils, contributing to their overall success and to the success of their house.



### 13. Support for Poor School Attendance (other than unauthorised term time leave)

Sometimes pupils can be reluctant to attend school. We encourage parents and pupils to be open and honest with us about the reason for the pupil's absence. If a child is reluctant to attend, it is never better to cover up their absence or for a parent to give in to pressure to let the child stay at home. This can give the impression to the child that attendance does not matter and can make things worse. As a school, we need to understand the reasons why a pupil is reluctant to attend to be able to support pupils and parents in the best way.

When we have concerns about the attendance of a pupil, we will do our best to make the parent/s aware of the concerns about their child's attendance and give them the opportunity to address this. However, if parents do not make use of the support offered and improve their child's attendance to an acceptable level, this may result in legal sanctions. Where there are no genuine reasons for the absences, parents may be asked to meet with the attendance manager to discuss the matter. In some cases, this may result in a formal action plan being produced in the form of an Attendance Contract.

If our school refers a case of poor school attendance to the Local Authority for legal sanctions, we will show that we have warned the parent/s that they are at risk of receiving a Penalty Notice or other legal sanction. This will at least be evidenced via the sending of a Notice to Improve – attendance warning letter.

We will not usually request legal sanctions from the Local Authority in cases where poor attendance is symptomatic of complex family circumstances. In such circumstances our school will take a holistic approach to the issue and involve other agencies as necessary. The exception to this will be where parents fail to accept or engage with support offered by the school and/or other agencies or fail to implement the suggested changes. Again, when referring for legal sanctions, we will show that we have warned the parent/s that they are at risk of receiving a Penalty Notice or other legal sanction.

If our school has safeguarding concerns about a pupil who is absent, we will share information with other agencies as we deem necessary.

### 14. Penalty Notices and Prosecutions

Parents have a legal responsibility to ensure that their child attends school on a regular basis. It is a criminal offence under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996 to fail to secure regular attendance of a registered pupil at the school. This applies to both resident and non-resident parents who may both be subject to legal sanctions if their child fails to attend school regularly. It also applies to others who may not be the parent but may have day to day care of the child.

Unauthorised absence from school can result in a number of different outcomes for parents and children. Each case is considered individually.

Under section 444 of the Education Act 1996, if a child of compulsory school age, who is a registered pupil at a school, fails to attend regularly at the school his/her parent(s) are guilty of an offence. Parents with more than one school aged child need to be aware that each child's irregular attendance is dealt with as a separate matter.

The school will refer cases of unauthorised absence that meet the threshold for a Penalty Notice to the Local Authority for legal action unless there are reasonable grounds for not doing so. The outcome of a referral to the Local Authority may be a Penalty Notice or Prosecution.

Penalty Notices are intended as a sanction for low level offences and a tool to support improved school attendance for example in circumstances associated with an unauthorised holiday taken during term time. They are an alternative to prosecution and may not be issued if prosecution is a more appropriate response to a pupil's irregular attendance.

A pupil's unauthorised absence from school could result in one of the following:





1. A Penalty Notice. The penalty is £80 per parent, per child payable within 21 days, rising to £160 per parent, per child if paid between 22 and 28 days. (Failure to pay will result in prosecution.) If a second Penalty Notice is issued within a rolling 3-year period the penalty is £160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 days. There will be no option to pay a lower amount.
2. Prosecution. Prosecution could lead to fines up to £2500 and /or up to 3 months imprisonment. (See DfE's statutory guidance on [School attendance parental responsibility measures](#) for more information.

Penalty Notices and prosecution proceedings are issued to each parent with responsibility for the child and are issued for each child with irregular attendance. For example, in the case of Penalty Notices, if two siblings had irregular school attendance, and there were two parents with responsibility for the children, four Penalty Notices would be issued. Penalty Notices cannot be paid in instalments.

In addition to Penalty Notices, there is a range of other legal interventions open to schools

We will work together with local authority and make use of the full range of legal interventions rather than relying solely on fixed penalty notices or prosecution, and will work closely with the local authority to decide whether to use them in an individual case after considering the individual circumstances of a family. These are: Parenting contracts, Education supervision orders, Attendance prosecution, Parenting orders, Fixed penalty notices

### 15. Children Missing Education (CME)

Our school will add and delete pupils from roll in line with the law. A pupil's name can only lawfully be deleted from the admission register if a reason set out in regulation 9 of the School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024. The school will make CME and Pupil Tracking referrals as appropriate. The school will seek advice from the local authority representative responsible for children missing education if unsure about any individual cases:

### 16. Following up Unexplained Absences

Where no contact has been made with the school, the school will contact parents by text, email, telephone or letter to try and establish the reason for a child's absence. When we establish the reason for the absence, we will mark it as authorised or unauthorised depending on the reason for the absence. If we are unable to establish the reason for absence within 3 school days, we will make the absence as unauthorised, using the O code. If we are concerned about a pupil's absence and are unable to contact the parent/s, we may contact the pupil's emergency contacts and/or other professionals or contacts of the family who we reasonably expect may be able to advise us of the pupil's whereabouts.

### 17. Reporting to Parents

Each term we will share pupil attendance records. We will also share the pupil's attendance in the pupil's school report twice per year. The aim of this communication is to give parents the opportunity to look at their child's attendance certificate and come back to us with any queries.

Where a child's attendance drops below the school target of 97%, for whatever reason, our school will write to the parents to highlight this, unless there is a good reason not to.

Parents are also able to view their pupil's attendance data on the school app.



## 18. Recording Information on Attendance and Reasons for Absence

Absences are recorded through Arbor, our school's management information system. When a pupil is absent, the details of the absence, including the reason provided, are logged in Arbor. This includes information about who made the call to report the absence and the specific reason given. This process ensures accurate record-keeping and allows us to monitor attendance patterns and follow up on any concerns regarding pupil absences.

## 19. Policy Monitoring Arrangements

This policy will be reviewed annually by the Vice Principal – Behaviour and Attitudes, or more frequently if there are changes to legislation and guidance. At every review, the policy will be shared with the governing body.

## 20. Links with other policies

This policy is linked to our Anti-Bullying Policy, Behaviour Policy, SEND Policy Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy and Supporting Pupils with Medical Conditions Policy.
